Alaska Constitution, Art. III, §3


"The governor shall be chosen by the qualified voters of the State at a general election. The candidate receiving the **greatest number of votes** shall be governor."

Alaska Constitution, Art. III, §8

"The lieutenant governor shall be nominated in the manner provided by law for nominating candidates for other elective offices. In the general election the votes cast for a candidate for governor shall be considered as cast also for the candidate for lieutenant governor running jointly with him. The candidate whose name appears on the ballot jointly with that of the successful candidate for governor shall be elected lieutenant governor."

"inactive ballot"...

...contains an overvote at the highest continuing ranking, or contains two or more sequential skipped rankings before its highest continuing ranking.

"ranked-choice voting" means...

"Concluded ballot"...

...contains an overvote at the highest continuing ranking, or contains two or more sequential skipped rankings before its highest continuing ranking.



An Act to Elect Certain Offices by Ranked Choice Voting

An Act to Elect Certain Offices by Ranked Choice Voting





(f) DEFINITIONS. - For the purposes of this Act, the following terms have the following meanings:

- 1. "Active candidate" means any candidate who has not been defeated or elected. -
- "Election threshold" means the number of votes sufficient for a candidate to be elected in a multi winner contest. The election threshold equals the total votes counted for active candidates in the first round of tabulation, divided by the sum of one plus the number of offices to be filled, then adding one, disregarding any fractions. Election threshold = ((Total votes cast)/(Seats to be elected+1)) +1, with any fraction disregarded.
- "Highest-ranked active candidate" means the active candidate assigned to a higher ranking than any other active candidates.
- 4. "Inactive ballots" are ballots that do not count for any candidate for any of the reasons given in subsection (d)1.
- "Overvote" means an instance in which a voter has ranked more than one candidate at the same ranking.
- 6. "Ranking" means the number available to be assigned by a voter to a candidate to express the voter's choice for that candidate. The number "1" is the highest ranking, followed by "2" and then "3" and so on.
- "Round" means an instance of the sequence of voting tabulation beginning with subsection (a)1 for single winner contests or subsection (b)1 for multi winner contests.
- "Skipped ranking" means a voter has left a ranking unassigned but ranks a candidate at a subsequent ranking.

"continuing candidate" means a candidate who has not been defeated;

"overvote" means an instance where a voter has assigned the same ranking to more than one candidate;


"ranking" or "ranked" means the number assigned by a voter to a candidate to express the voter's choice for that candidate; a ranking of "1" is the highest ranking, followed by "2," and then "3," and so on;

"round" means an instance of the sequence of voting tabulation in a general election;

"skipped ranking" means a blank ranking on a ballot on which a voter has ranked another candidate at a subsequent ranking.



RANKED CHOICE VOTING FAVORS WHITE, AFFLUENT VOTERS

"[Ranked choice voting] leaves open the well-documented voting gap that favors white voters and the affluent... The evidence shows a clear pattern. [In Minneapolis] voters who were more affluent and whiter turned out at a higher rate, completed their ballots more accurately, and were more likely to use all three opportunities to rank their most preferred candidates compared with voters living in low-income neighborhoods."

ALASKA'S HISTORY OF NONPARTISANSHIP

1978 – Dick Randolph was elected to the Alaska House – the first Libertarian candidate elected to a state legislature in US history

1990 – Wally Hickel elected governor on the Alaska Independence Party ticket


2007-2013 — Alaska's Senate governed by a bi-partisan majority — initially 9 Democrats and 6 Republicans

2010 – Lisa Murkowski wins a historic write-in campaign, beating both the Republican & Democratic candidates

2014 – Independent Bill Walker elected governor on a unity ticket

2019-2021 – Alaska House governed by a bi-partisan majority, led by an Independent Speaker


